
FOREST LAW ENFORCEMENT, GOVERNANCE AND TRADE (FLEGT)

FAO has supported over 200 projects in 40 tropical

timber-producing

countries

to improve forest governance and support legal timber trade.



FAO works with the European Union (EU), member states, partner organizations and local stakeholders to help prepare timber-producing countries in Asia, Africa and **South America** to implement bilateral trade agreements on legal timber with the EU.



15 countries are implementing or negotiating bilateral trade agreements, eventually leading to FLEGT licensed timber with preferential access to the EU market.



In 2016, Indonesia and the EU agreed to issue the world's **first FLEGT license** ensuring timber arriving in the EU has been legally harvested, transported, processed and traded.


